Students that participate in the Decatur Band Program are challenged to grow musically and encouraged to achieve their highest potential. In order for this to occur, students must respect their director, their fellow musicians, their instruments and supplies, the music they perform, any guests, and all of the work that each person puts into the band.

If you follow the rules as laid out in this handbook as well as in class, your reward will be like nothing you have experienced before. You will feel pride, a sense of accomplishment, self satisfaction, and fun ③

I. Course Rationale

Beginning Band is a **yearlong course and commitment** and is a unique and exciting opportunity to learn a musical instrument and to learn to read music. After the first week of school (when improper schedules are fixed), the student must remain in band for the entirety of the year - we are a team and depend on one another to perform to the best of our ability just like sports teams. Students have the opportunity to begin a lifetime of music learning and enjoyment as a performer as well as a listener. Playing a musical instrument teaches the learner about more than just music. More importantly, it teaches self discipline, accountability, self expression, teamwork, leadership, and problem solving that is easily understood by the 6th grade student.

II. Course objectives

Throughout the school year, beginning band students will learn:

- a. Proper instrument assembly and care
- b. Correct posture and sound production
- c. Correct fingerings, stick grips, and positions
- d. Proper practice habits
- e. Basic music terminology
- f. Visual and aural instrument identification
- g. Formal and informal concert settings
- h. Rhythm patterns and time signatures

- i. Beginning rudiments and philosophy for percussionists
- j. Key signatures
- k. Phrasing
- I. Independent parts
- m. Contrasting tempos and dynamics
- n. Melodic variations
- o. Articulation
- How to perform in a small ensemble as well as a whole band

III. Required Materials

These materials are required for class daily:

- Pencil
- Essential Elements 2000 Book 1 (\$10 or \$17 for percussion) *Provided if renting an instrument
- Instrument (purchased/rented from local music store such as Meyer Music or Marshall Music no EBay instruments please! You may also use a school instrument with my permission and availability) more information can be found in section V)
- Supplies (cork grease, valve oil, slide grease, spray bottle (trombone), reeds, etc. Anything required for your instrument to work!)

IV. Objectives/Goals

The student will:

- 1. Perform on instruments, alone and with others, a varied repertoire of music.
- 2. Read and notate music.
- 3. Listen to, analyze, and describe music.
- 4. Evaluate music and music performances.
- 5. Understand some basic relationships between music, the other arts, and disciplines outside the arts.
- 6. Demonstrate by action, student individual improvement gained by a pursuit of excellence, and contribute that musicianship to the group of which the student is a member.

V. Obtaining an Instrument

Renting or purchasing an instrument and maintaining it is an investment, but its benefits last a lifetime. Meyer Music information has been attached for your rental needs. We will be having an instrument information and rental night on Tuesday, September 5, 2017 @ 6:00pm in the band room! Please mark your calendars! This is the evening of the FIRST DAY ⁽³⁾



- If money is an issue, there are a <u>limited</u> amount of school owned instruments for your student to use at <u>NO cost</u>. These instruments are a first come, first serve and not all instruments are available. If your student has a serious interest in band and there is not a school instrument for their use, one will be found for their use. A student will never be turned away because the lack of funds. <u>Please</u> <u>attend the rental meeting even if you need to borrow a school instrument so it can be arranged.</u>
- The last option is for you to buy an instrument on your own. You can always buy a used instrument rather than a new one as they are more cost effective. If a family member owns an instrument your student wants to use, please have them bring it to Mrs. Wicklund for inspection. Stay clear of Wal-Mart or Meijer instruments as they are low quality and will not last long. EBay is OK but you never know what you are going to get for your money. If you want an opinion, please send the link to Mrs. Wicklund.

Any instrument rented, owned, or borrowed from the school is the student's and parent's responsibility for the entire year. These instruments can be taken home to practice! While at school, an instrument locker will be provided with a combination lock to keep them safe and prevent theft.

VI. Assessment

The learner will be evaluated by performance on playing tests, written tests & quizzes,

performances/concerts, homework, weekly practice records, daily class participation & effort, behavior, and group activities.

VII. Grading Policies

Final grades will be determined by the following factors each quarter and semester:

- 1. Daily attendance and active participation in the group, including the amount of effort during participation.
- 2. Playing tests
- 3. Written tests over musical terms/symbols and any information relevant to what is currently being studied in class or rehearsals.
- 4. Other assignments/projects as they become relevant to the material being studied.
- 5. Musical performances/concerts (there may not be one in every grading period, and some grading periods may have more than one)
- 6. Weekly practice records, worth 75 points each (due every Monday) Practice is THAT important!!
- 7. Bringing ALL needed materials to class DAILY
 - Instrument and all necessary supplies (reed, mouthpiece, cork grease, valve oil, etc.)
 - Band book and music
 - Pencil

8. Students are <u>REQUIRED</u> to purchase Essential Elements 2000 band book for their appropriate grade level. The cost is \$10 for woodwind and brass players and \$17 for percussionists. I will order these for the students ©

VIII. Weekly Practice Records

This is based on an average of approximately 15 minutes per day for 5 days each week, with a goal of 75 minutes each week. Practice records will be completed each Monday **in class** on the surface pro and submitted to schoology for a grade ©

- Practice records WILL NOT require a parent/guardian signature and must be turned in each week.
- Practice records are due every Monday, but you may turn it in late by Friday of that week with NO PENALTY. If there is no school on Monday, we will complete it on Tuesday ©
- All practice records for the marking period are due by the LAST DAY of the marking period.

IX. Written Tests, Quizzes, Homework, etc. (as needed)

The amount of total points possible may vary for each assignment.

a. <u>Playing tests</u>

Students will demonstrate correct performance technique on material they have learned. Playing tests may be given weekly or as needed throughout the school year. Students will be evaluated on musical elements such as tone quality, rhythmic precision, technical accuracy, and musicality. These tests ensure that the students are practicing the most important concepts learned in class, and can demonstrate these concepts accurately. This shows the rate of the student's improvement and understanding of the concepts explained in class. This also informs Mrs. Wicklund what she can help you with! Quizzes and tests are worth 30% of the student's overall grade.

b. <u>Concerts/Performances</u>

Each student is **<u>REQUIRED</u>** to participate in each concert or performance, and only excused absences will be allowed such as sudden illness, death in the family, family emergency, and weddings. If you *know* you are going to be absent from a performance, please let Mrs. Wicklund know as soon as you find out. A note from the parent/guardian and/or doctor (for illnesses) <u>MUST</u> accompany the request to be excused. We may have to train someone else to play your music. Each performance or concert is worth HALF of the student's grade. The points may vary from performance to performance. If a student does not attend a performance and has an unexcused absence, he/she will receive zero points on that performance. A note explaining the absence must be turned in to Mrs. Wicklund <u>within one week</u> of the performance in addition to completing "musical community service" (which is explained in the next section) will be required to receive full credit. Students must be professional and positive at all times as they are reflecting and upholding the standards of the school, community, and the fine arts program. ALL PERFORMANCES ARE MANDATORY</u>.

X. Performance Dress/Concert Attire

The concert dress this year is dressy black and white. Please ensure that you have the appropriate clothing necessary BEFORE performances, as it is an important reflection on our group. There will be two concerts - a performance calendar is in this packet ©

<u>Gentleman:</u> Black dress pants, black socks, and black dress shoes on the bottom and a white dress shirt or white polo shirt on top. <u>Ladies:</u> Black dress pants or black skirts (knee length or longer), black socks or black

nylons, and black dress shoes on the bottom with a white dress shirt on top (no plunging necklines and must have sleeves). Keep jewelry at a minimum and no perfume as the stage lights tend to amplify and mix all fragrances together. NO FLIP FLOPS OR TENNIS SHOES ARE ALLOWED.

XI. Participation/Effort

Your grade is based on the following:

- Each performance or concert is considered as a major test and will be graded as such they are worth 100 points and 50% of the overall grade. Therefore, any performance that is missed and NOT excused will receive zero points. A student's grade may be reduced if they do not bring all of their necessary materials or if they do not meet the appropriate concert dress code.
- 2. Daily participation and effort is extremely important to a successful music program and is 20% of the overall grade. Each student will receive a daily participation/effort grade as follows:
 - a. 5 points participated with instrument at all times during class, brought all materials to class, behaved very well and followed directions, and put forth an excellent effort in class.
 - b. 4 points participated most of the time with instrument in class, brought most materials to class, had very few behavioral problems, and put forth a good effort in class.
 - c. 3 points participated occasionally with instrument in class, brought few materials to class, had some behavioral problems, and put forth less than average effort in class.
 - d. O points no instrument or no materials, didn't participate in class, put forth little or no effort in class, and/or many behavioral problems. No instrument is NO points!
 - e. Individual points will be deducted for misbehavior. Each student starts with 5 points unless they come without their required materials.

XII. Student expectations/Behavior Policy

Students will abide by the policies set forth in the 2017-2018 Raider Handbook as well as the following:

- 1. No gum, candy, pop, or food is allowed in the classroom at any time. A bottle of water is acceptable.
- 2. No cellular phones or electronic devices. See policy below in section XIV.
- 3. Treating your fellow students and instructor with respect is expected at all times.
- 4. Come to class with a positive attitude and a willingness to learn
- 5. Follow the band room "Entrance Routine" which is posted in the classroom.
- 6. You are expected to be in your seat and prepared for class shortly after the bell rings. This means having your instrument and music out and ready to begin.
- 7. You MUST have a pencil DAILY.
- 8. All classroom or student's materials, supplies, and equipment will be treated with care at all times.
- 9. Be attentive in class and listen to the teacher. DO not talk in class unless your instructor has given you permission.
- 10. Other rules may be added if the need arises.
- 11. Leave it better than you found it.

XIII. Consequences

The following is a list of corrective actions to be taken if unacceptable student behavior persists in the classroom (not necessarily in this sequence):

- 1. The student will be given a verbal warning that the behavior is unacceptable and that more action will occur if the student does not cease the behavior.
- 2. If possible, the student will be moved elsewhere in the classroom.
- 3. The student will not receive full grades for behavior/participation for the day/performance.
- 4. A conference with the parent, teacher, and principal may be scheduled.
- 5. The student may receive a detention, to be carried out that day or the next day after or before school.
- 6. The student may be referred to the principal for corrective action.
- 7. The student may be asked to put away their instrument, losing their participation points for the day, and will sit in a location so as not to be distracting to the rest of the class.
- 8. Other consequences as deemed appropriate by the teacher as the need arises.
- 9. Please refer to the 2017-2018 Raider Handbook for tardy/attendance consequences.

XIV. Cellular phone/Electronic Device Policy

Students are not allowed to have cell phones or any electronic device turned on during a rehearsal or performance. Such devices are a distraction and therefore are not to be seen or heard during a rehearsal or performance. Violation of this rule will result in losing the cell phone/device for the rest of the day. Chronic disruptions will result in turning the phone over to DMS Administration. If you have a cell phone at practice or performance, make sure it is turned off. All district policies are in effect during all rehearsals and performances. See the handbook for these details.

XV. Beginning Band Schedule

All beginning band students will meet daily! We will not begin playing and learning instruments until each student has an instrument and all materials needed to be successful ©

XVI. Communication Channels

I will be using the following services to send out reminders and information regarding concerts, trips, fundraisers, due dates, etc. Please subscribe by phone or computer if possible. Instructions for Remind and Schoology are attached ©

- 4. Email be sure to write your address legibly on the handbook agreement form
